Overview

CiA® 402 refers to CAN in Automation (CiA) CANopen® Drives and Motion Control Profile 402. The defining documents are available from <http://www.can-cia.org/> (See their respective trademarks.)

Note: The latest specification 302v3 (proposal) contains a significant number of options. The specification (proposal) is also dynamic as additional features are added by various members of the Special Interest Group (SIG).

This Application Note describes QuickSilver Controls implementation of the CiA 402 specification. The 402 operation is implemented by downloading a special initialization and operational code into the SilverDust unit. The minimum code revision is 44-1x. Many of the objects are directly mapped in the firmware, while other objects are mapped to “user” registers and evaluated by the 402 initialization program.

CANopen® and CiA® are registered community trade marks of CAN in Automation e.V.

Implementation

CiA 402 is implemented in several layers by many different state machines. CiA 402 also depends upon other specifications (i.e. CiA 301 regarding the CANopen communications).

The Network Management NMT, Communications protocols, Communications profile, and Object Dictionary portions are all implemented in hardware/firmware. The Power Drive System (PDS) finite state automation (FSA), which is the state machine governing power sequencing of the driver, is implemented in the special 402 initialization code. The Homing Mode (hm) and Profile Position Mode (pp) options are implemented.

For this implementation, the various user registers should not be accessed directly (Objects 21xxh), (reading is permissible). Normal interaction should be done using the CiA 402 objects.

Factory options

Several factory options have been implemented:

Status Word 6041h bit 14 high indicates homing completed and ready for other motions.

Homing routines have additional hard stop homing modes. See Homing section.

An encoder following mode has been added via Modes of operation mode –1. See **Encoder Following**.

User Options in the code

Main Init and User Customization [0] holds all of the options the user normally should configure.

Line 9: Identity – sets both the Serial Interface ID. This same value is automatically used to set the CAN ID on line 22.

Lines 11,13,15,17: Configures the serial interface
Line 20 sets the CAN baud rate.

Line 25 allows the default TPDOs to be enabled or disabled. A system using SDOs for verified communications would not need (or want) the TPDOs active. A value of 0 leaves them deactivated, a value of 1 is default and activates them.

Line 27 allows the unit to power up automatically to “Operation Enabled” without going through the normal startup sequence. 402 standard operation should have this disabled (0)

Lines 30, 32, 34, 36 configure the brake function. If not brake is present, Brake IO Bit number (line 36) to 0 and the brake function will be disabled; if the brake is to be used, select the IO that will be used (i.e. setting this register to 7 will use IO7). The brake activate time is the delay to allow the brake to go to the locked state before the drive is disabled. The brake release time is the time needed for the brake to allow free rotation after the drive has been enabled and before any motion is allowed. IO direction to release brake: The IO bit selected will be set to the selected state (0 = low, 1=high) to cause the driver to release the brake. If used with a controller with 24v IO, normally a low (0) would be used to energize the brake, releasing clutch and allowing free rotation. If using your own driver from IO1-IO7, a resistor should be used to pull the IO to the brake-locked polarity until the unit has had time to become energized. IO 4, 5, 6, and 7 have only a 200k internal pull-up resistor internally, so a 4.7k resistor to either +5v or 0v (your brake-locked level) should suffice. **NOTE:** as the brake bit is user configurable, it is not reflected in the brake bit of the IO word. The user **must avoid** writing to the IO bit being used for the brake! The IO configuration word may be set to mask this bit so that it can not be overwritten via the IO word. See CANopen manual, object 60Feh.

Lines 39-46 – Do not modify. These disable the motor prior to configuration.

Lines 51 and 53 are normally left AUTO to select the appropriate voltage for the motor when the unit is configured.

Lines 58 and 60 are used to tune the motor controller to the load. The default normally works from open shaft to about a 5:1 inertial mismatch. See tuning application note for details.

Line 63 sets the motor direction corresponding to a positive motion. CW is the default and refers to CW direction with the shaft facing you.

Line 65 and 67 sets the anti-hunt constants to allow the motor not to dither when stopped. They may be set to 0 to disable the anti-hunt. See command reference manual for more details.

Line 69 sets the S-curve factor. This is used only in some of the homing moves, and not for the normal motions. Normally 0.

Lines 72, 74, and 76 configure the negative limit switch, the positive limit switch and the home switch, respectively. The limit switches need to be disabled (as shown) if not present to prevent a Fault upon entering "Operation Enabled" due to the detection of an "outside limits" condition. If disabled, these three switches default to IO1, IO2, and IO3, active high. See CANopen manual object 2004 for configuration to other IO.

Line 78 – leave enabled for standard 402 with these parameters configured via CAN. Disable to allow the various parameters to be configured.

Lines 79-118 configure the various motion parameters and response for faults if line 78 is disabled. See CANopen manual for details.

Line 123 sets the maximum error allowed before indicating motion error.

Line 128 sets the default digital filter for all digital inputs on the IO channels.

Basics

The drive device is controlled primarily by the use of the Control Word and Target Values, with fault and status feedback provided via the Status Word.

The PDS FSA state machine controls the sequencing of power to the drive, and access to drive motion. It also provides the ability to react to faults and to disable the drive if so needed.

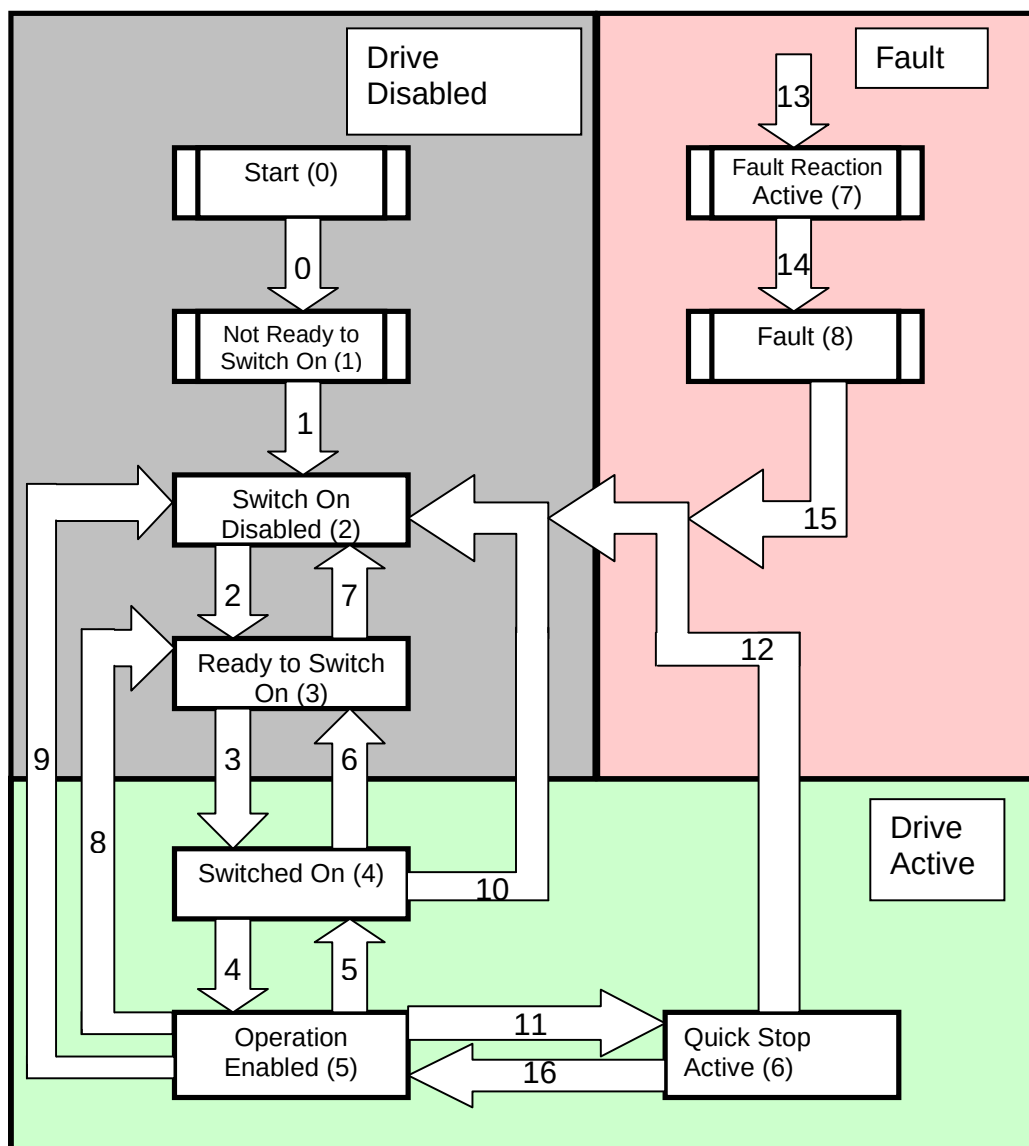
The various configuration registers are normally configured using SDO operations. The status and command word operations are often set and read using PDO communications, but can also be managed using SDO operations. PDO operation can "be in the background", but are not confirmed, and can also use up significant amounts of bus time if there are many units all reporting their positions continuously while moving. The SDO method allows control of bus activity as the vast majority of packets are the SDO commands and their responses.

Line 25 (above) should be set to disable the PDO operations if they are not being used, so as to minimize bus traffic. The choice of operation is a system level decision.

Control Word and Status Word – System State Machine

Object 6040h is used to request state transitions while Object 6041h reflects the current state of the State Machine. The boxed names represent States, while the numbered arrows represent Transitions. The numbered states (#) are the internal states used in the implementation. In each case, the state reflected by Object 6041h is updated when the transition has been completed. Fault Reaction Active is the exception in that the fault is immediately reported when the fault is detected, while the fault reaction is still underway; when the reaction is completed, the state then automatically transitions to Fault.

State Machine Transition Diagram



Note (#) are internal states used in QCI implementation

CAN Dictionary Object 6040h writes to the Control Word input (request) to the State Machine, while Object 6041 displays the Status Word (actual State Machine state).

One set of bit fields in the Control Word is used to implement the commands to the PDS FSA state machine, while others are dependent upon the operation mode (selected via Object 6060h Mode of Operation and displayed via 6061h Mode of Operation Display).

The rising edge of Bit 7 is used to reset a fault, while bits 3,2,1,0 of the Control Word are used to request transitions from the current PDS FSA state to a new state. In state Operation Enabled, Bit 8 halts a current motion, while the functions of Bits 9, 6, 5, and 4 are dependent upon the current Mode of Operation. Bit 10 is reserved, while bits 15, 14, 13, 12 are "Manufacturer specific" – not currently used, but provided to allow additional functions may be added to the code to take advantage of these.

Bit Definitions:

- Bits 15..11 = Manufacturer specific (optional – may be implemented in user code)
- Bits 10 = reserved
- Bit 9 = Operation mode specific (vary according to mode selected)
- Bit 8 = Halt
- Bit 7 = Fault Reset
- Bits 6..4 = Operation mode specific (vary according to mode selected)
- Bit 3 = Enable Operation
- Bit 2 = Quick Stop
- Bit 1 = Enable Voltage
- Bit 0 = Switch On

Note: "Enable Operation" from state "Ready to Switch on" will perform transitions 3 and 4 in succession.

State Transition Events

Transition 0: Startup => Not Ready to Switch ON

Event: Reset - self-test/initialization – happens before CAN is configured.

Transition 1: Not Ready to Switch ON => Switch On Disabled

Event: Successful initialization - Activate Communication

Transition 2: Switch On Disabled => Ready to Switch On

Event: "Shutdown" command received from host

Transition 3: Ready to Switch On => Switched On

Event: "Switch On" command received from host - switch on power section (if applicable), drive still disabled.

Transition 4: Switched On => Operation Enable

Event: "Enable Operation" command received from host. Enable the drive function.

Transition 5: Operation Enable => Switched On

Event: "Disable Operation" command received from host. Disable drive operation.
Affected by Objects 605Ch.

Transition 6: Switched On => Ready to Switch On

Event: "Shutdown" command received from host. Switch off power section (if applicable).

Transition 7: Ready to Switch On => Switch On Disabled

Event: "Quick Stop" or "Disable Voltage" command received from host. Transition states

Transition 8: Operation Enable => Ready to Switch On

Event: "Shutdown" command received from host. Switch off power section, motor free to rotate. Affected by Objects 605Bh.

Transition 9: Operation Enable => Switch On Disabled

Event: "Disable Voltage" command received from host. Switch off power section, motor free to rotate.

Transition 10: Switched On => Switch On Disabled

Event: "Disable Voltage" and "Quick Stop" command received from host. Switch off power section, motor free to rotate.

Transition 11: Operation Enable => Quick Stop Active

Event: "Quick Stop" command received from host - execute Quick Stop function. This operation is affected by Object 605Ah.

Transition 12: Quick Stop Active => Switch On Disabled

Event: "Quick Stop" or "Disable Voltage" command received from host, turn off power section. Disable the Drive and Drive Voltage (if applicable).

Transition 13: Any State => Fault Reaction Active

Event: A fault has been detected in the drive - react to the fault according to Objects 605Eh

Transition 14: Fault Reaction Active => Fault

Event: fault recovery completed - disable the drive, power may be switched off. Affected by Objects 605Eh

Transition 15: Fault => Switch On Disabled

Event: "Fault Reset" command received from host - reset fault detect (if fault has cleared), bit "Fault Reset" must be cleared by host

Transition 16: Quick Stop Active => Operation Enable

Event: "Enable Operation" command received from host (if quick-stop-option-code – Object 605Ah is 5,6,7 or 8 - enable the drive

NOTE: If a command is received which causes a change of state, this command must be processed completely and the new state attained before the next command can be processed.

NOTE: "Drive function disabled" means no energy can be supplied to the motor, reference values (torque, velocity, position) may be processed, but no signal to the motor results. If the Brake options has been configured, the brake is turned on, the brake enable delay elapses, then the drive is disabled; the reverse process happens when the drive function is enabled: the drive is first enabled, the brake is disabled, the brake disable delay is allowed to elapse, and then motion is allowed.

Status Word 6041h

The PDS FSA State is reflected in Status Word (6041h):

Bit 15 = Manufacturer specific (opt)

Bit 14 = Manufacturer Specific (1=Home has completed, ok to use pp mode)

Bits 12..13 = Operation mode specific (opt)

Bits 11 = Internal limit active (position range exceeded, velocity limit, etc.)

Bit 10 = Target Reached (1=Axis motion done; the axis is stopped but not necessarily at target if Halt active)

Bit 9 = Remote (1=listening to 6040h, 0 = operating as local master - will not respond to a command written to 6040h)

Bit 8 = manufacturer specific (opt)

Bit 7 = Warning (opt)

Bit 6 = Switch On Disabled

Bit 5 = Quick Stop (0 = Drive is reacting to a Quick Stop request)

Bit 4 = Voltage Enabled (1 = enabled)

Bit 3 = Fault (1 = Fault)

Bit 2 = Operation Enabled (1=Enabled)

Bit 1 = Switched On (1=Switched On)

Bit 0 = Ready to Switch On (1=Ready to Switch on)

Again, bits in the Status Word may be grouped to aid understanding. Current State is reflected in bits {6, 5, 3, 2, 1, 0}, with various combinations given names corresponding to the earlier state diagram:

Description of States**Not Ready to Switch ON:**

Driver "HV" Power Disabled - if there is a provision to switch drive power. Processor power on, drive initialization in progress, BRAKE on in this state, if present

Switch On Disabled:

Driver "HV" Power Disabled - if there is a provision to switch drive power. Processor power on, Initialization complete, drive parameters set up, drive disabled

Ready to Switch On

Ready to have High Voltage power applied.

Switched On

High Voltage enabled to driver, power amp ready, drive function disabled

Operation Enabled

Power enabled to driver, no faults have been detected, drive function is enabled and there is power to motor. The servo is active.

Quick Stop Active

Power enabled to driver, Quick stop function is being executed, drive function is enabled, and power is applied to motor.

Note: If quick stop option codes 0x605A value is set to 5 through 8, the drive will remain active and may be switched quickly to Operation Enabled; other options will cause the drive to be switched off and the state to transition to Switch On Disabled.

Fault Reaction Active

A fault has occurred in drive, quick stop being executed. Drive enabled and power are applied to drive while reacting.

Fault

A fault has occurred, high voltage MAY be switched off, and drive function is disabled.

Power up Sequencing

Note: an example of the power up sequencing is provided in “Unit 17 - Remote Configure 16.qcp – also see **CiA 402 Initialization** section below for flow diagrams.

- 1) At power up/reset the state machine first reports a Transitions to “Switch on Disabled” once the CANopen communications are operating. This state is only entered from a power up / hard reset and indicates the drive needs to be configured.
- 2) The Master configures/reconfigures PDO configuration objects if the default configuration is not as needed.
- 3) The Master configures the various reaction options, default velocities, etc.
- 4) The master sets the slave NMT state to operational. (This is needed before going into PDS FSA state “Operation Enabled” to avoid a communications fault.)
- 5) The Master sends operation “Shutdown” to exit state “Switch on Disabled”. This acknowledges that the master has completed any configuration needed following a power up / reset of the drive.
- 6) The drive transitions to state “Ready to Switch On”
- 7) The Master sends operation “Switch On” (optionally the master may send operation “Enable operation”, which will perform both Switch On and “Enable operation functions”).
- 8) The drive will transition to state “Switched On”
- 9) The master sends operation “Enable operation” (if it did not already send it in step 7)
- 10) The drive will verify drive enable and power are present and enable the drive. If this is the first enabling since power up, the drive will perform a commutation alignment “start-up wiggle”. Servo operation is enabled. Operational fault detection is enabled to verify that heartbeat is active and NMT state is “operational”. The drive will monitor object 6060h Mode of Operation to determine what motions are asked of the drive.
- 11) The master must home the drive before performing any motions. Homing is needed to set any motion limits as well as to determine the reference position for motion.
 - a. Master configures homing speeds and accelerations and offset, as well as maximum velocities and accelerations / decelerations (if not previously set) – See Objects Implemented for Details.
 - b. Master selects homing method via object 6098h (if not previously set)
 - c. Master selects mode hm (6 = homing mode) via object 6060h
 - d. Slave responds with mode hm (6) via object 6061h. Status Word bits 12 (Home Found) and 13 (Homing error) are cleared.
 - e. Master activated homing mode by setting Control Word bit 4 (Start Homing).
Note: Control Word Bit 8 (Halt) must be low. A high will cause the homing to stop; bringing it low again will cause the homing to restart.
 - f. When the homing starts, the drive clears Status Word bit 10 (Target reached) to indicate motion is active.
 - g. If the zero point is located in the homing motion, the drive sets Status Word bit 12 (Home found), followed by Status Word bit 10 (Target Reached) when the motion completes. If an error is encountered, then the drive sets Status Word bit 14 (Homing Error), followed by Status Word bit 10 (Target Reached) when the motion stops. Manufacturer specific Status Word bit 14 (Homing Completed) is also set, indicating the drive is ready to accept other motion commands. The end

- of travel switches as well as the soft position limits are engaged when Status Word bit 14 is set.
- h. The Master may clear Control Word bit 4 (Start) once the homing has started. If it has not done so, it should clear the bit now.
- 12) The Master changes to Profile Position Mode of operation
- a. The master selects mode pp (1=profile position) via object 6060h Mode of Operation.
 - b. The drive responds by setting object 6061h Mode of Operation Display to pp (1). Status word bit 12 (Set Point Acknowledge) is cleared.
- 13) The Master selects Next position for motion
- a. The master sets object 607Ah New Target Position to the next desired target position. Absolute or relative positioning is determined by Control Word bit 6 (Absolute = 0, Relative=1). Control Word bit 8 (Halt) should be low to enable the next motion. Control Word bit 5 (Change Set Point Now) and bit 9 (Change on Set Point) should be set according to need (both low if doing point-to-point).
 - b. The master sets Control Word bit 4 (New Set Point). This causes the new set point to be latched and the motion started.
 - c. The drive responds by setting Status Word bit 10 (Set Point Acknowledge).
- 14) The Master configures the next position for motion
- a. The master may now clear Control Word bit 4 (New Set Point) and change the Target Position and other target related inputs including various accelerations and velocities for the next motion (the prior values are latched internally).
 - b. The drive responds by clearing Status Word bit 10 (Set Point Acknowledge) when drive is ready to accept another set point into storage. Note that the drive will always accept a new set point if Control Word bit 5 (Change Set Point Now) is set.
- 15) The Master may now continue setting set points, choosing to allow completion before continuing, overriding, or change on set point (update the acceleration and velocities without stopping when the first set point is reached). The change on set point assumes the new set point is in the same direction of travel; if a reversal in direction is needed, the motion is stopped at the first set point, and then the new motion to the following set point is initiated. See CiA 402v3 for more details.

Encoder Following

A factory motion type –1 has been added to the basic implementation to allow an axis to follow an external encoder quadrature input signal. The quadrature signals should be applied to IO4 and IO5.

Two parameters are associated with the encoder following mode, Acceleration Factor, and Scale Factor. These allow the following mode to be engaged following a leading axis which is initially stopped or operating slowly when engaging/disengaging the following operation, or to allow the following axis to ramp up to the desired following speed and to ramp down when engaging and disengaging with a leading axis that is already in motion.

The acceleration factor is the change in effective Scale Factor per input encoder count. If set as high as the magnitude of the Scale Factor, the motion will immediately reach the rate of motion as the Scale Factor with no ramp up or ramp down. This is useful for following when the leader is initially slow or stopped. If the Acceleration Factor set lower, a trapezoidal ramp up and optionally ramp down will be used. The Scale factor is set at 218C.1h (register 140) as a U32. The Scale factor is the desired output counts/ input counts * 10,000,000. (See the command reference for Electronic Gearing Mode (EGM) for a full description. Note that the Acceleration Factor and Scale Factor registers are “live” allowing updating while the motion is in progress.

The Encoder Following mode (ef) is only available after homing. The Scale Factor and Acceleration terms should be set prior to use, but can be changed while the motion is in process – they are not buffered and are immediately acted upon if the EGM mode is active.

Mode of operation (6060h): Factory mode =-1 selects Encoder Following

Set Acceleration and Scale factor (Note: it is OK to set these prior to entering mode if desired – these registers are not altered by the program)

Clear Command word bits 5 and 8, then set bit 4 high. The set point will be acknowledged via Status word Bit 12; Bit 9 will also be cleared as we are following the encoder. According to the acceleration and scale factors, the output motion will ramp up and follow the input encoder.

After Status bit 12 is detected high, Command bit 4 should be cleared to a low level.

The follow encoder can be ended several different ways. If the input motion is stopped, the easiest method is to exit the motion is to set Command bits 5 and 6 high to indicate stop following via a hard stop, and then strobe Command bit 4 high until Status bit 12 goes high, then bring Command bit 4 low. The output should already have been stopped, so the stopping involves ignoring the input encoder changes. The Status bit 9 (Target Reached) should go active (high) after a short period. The mode may then be exited by selecting a different mode via 6060h. If another follow period is desired rather than exiting, configure Command bits 5 and 8 appropriately and activate via New Setpoint (bit 4), again clearing the strobe bit once acknowledged. If the input encoder is still in motion and it is desired to stop the following axis, the stop using acceleration factor may be selected via Command Bit 6 being low. This will decelerate using the current value of the Acceleration Factor register. Finally, the Halt bit in the Command word may be used to stop the current motion using the modes configured via 605Dh and the associated deceleration values.

Note: the Maximum acceleration, deceleration, and velocity values associated with the pp move are ***ignored*** in the normal operation of the **Encoder Following** mode.

Homing Methods

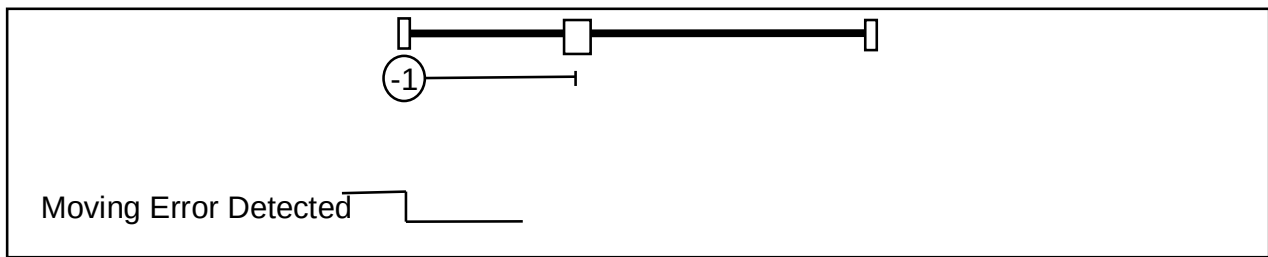
Homing Method (6098h) selects what homing method will be used. Methods 1 through 35 are defined in 402v3.0 while methods –1 through –128 are reserved for custom homing methods. Currently Special Methods –4 through –1 have been implemented.

The default limit switches are Negative Limit Switch = IO1, Positive Limit Switch = IO2, Home Switch = IO3. These may be reconfigured via Object 2004h.

Additional Homing Methods

Additional custom homing methods may be requested by contacting QuickSilver Controls, or by editing the 402 Initialization file. Examples would include home against a hard stop in combination with a sensor or index pulse, etc., to eliminate limit switches in applications in which the hardware is sufficiently robust to support a slow “crash” into a hard stop. Any additional homing methods may be defined to use methods –1 to –128. None of these custom homing routines are currently implemented.

CiA 402 Initialization

A demonstration configuration program is also provided (“Unit 17 - Remote Configure 16.qcp”) to test the 402 implementation.

To use this program file, the 402 drive must be initialized to Unit 16 (by use of the switches if present or by changing the Comm ID for units without CAN ID and CAN Baud switches).

A second drive must be initialized as ID 17 using “Factory Default Initialization - CAN.qcp” Next, “Unit 17 - Remote Configure 16.qcp” must be downloaded.

The program first configures its own local PDOs and then switches itself to NMT operational. Next, it configures the 402 drive acceleration and options to allow operation. Next the 402 drive is switched to NMT operational.

The program then steps through the power machine states from Switch On Disabled to Ready to Switch on, Switched On, Operation Enabled. (Note: no error checking is done in this demo program).

Next, homing mode is selected, using a simple home (home to index - others may be easily selected). Upon completion, the drive then performs two point to point moves, pausing in-between.

Initialization Section

The following code excerpt from “Unit 17 - Remote Configure 16.qcp” shows the start of the initialization of the various configuration objects on the 402 Drive unit.

Note: “CiA 402 Initialization.qcp” has an optional initialization section in Program 2: User CAN register Initialization. To enable local initialization, disable line 2 in this program, and update the various modes, accelerations, decelerations, velocities, and limits as desired. This will reduce the startup overhead if desired.

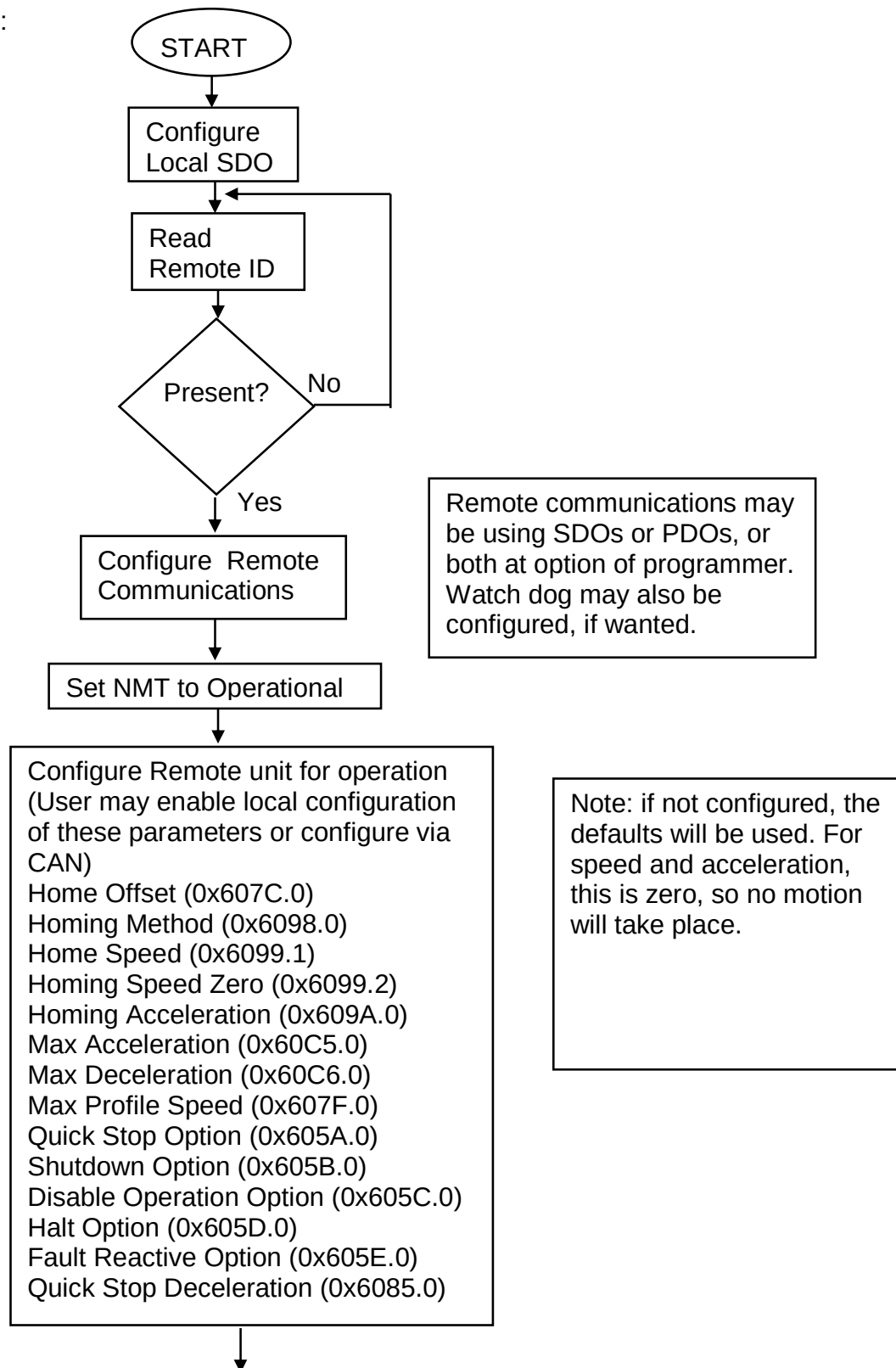
